


Just a Human Being




Gandhi is known for gaining independence for India, his 200-mile salt march, and his Satyagraha movements

- Gandhi said in speech: "I do not even regard him as guilty of Swami's murder. Guilty indeed are those who excited feeling of hatred against one another."
- Obituary: "He lived a hero. He died a hero."

⁻Stabbed him while he was resting

⁻In essence, he was putting the blame on Shraddhanand. Abdul Rashid is not fault because under ordinary circumstances, he may have not known who the Swami even was. However, he excited feelings of hatred and he is the one to blame, not the murderer.

⁻Gandhi contradicted himself in his obituary note however. "He lived a hero. He died a hero." He was putting this image in front of him that he was ashamed of the Swami's actions, however he held him in high regard in his obituary. This shows that Gandhi was willing to appease the Muslims than standing up against the murder.






- Gandhi at first opposed partition
