- *Usted is a formal and more respectful way to greet or talk to someone. Especially if you talking to someone that part of the list.*
- *You have to be real careful who you use Usted to because you may be using u tu but really you suppose to use Usted.*

■ *The times you will use Usted is when you are addressing :*

- *someone you don't know well (unless if they are your age)*
- *an older person (Grandma, Mom, 95 year old women)*
- *an authority figure/ higher rank (your boss, your teacher, a policeman, president, celebrities etc.)*
- *someone who you know but you are not close to them (a neighbor)*
- *someone whom you would address by their title .*
Dr. Smith, Mr. John etc.)



U Tú

- *You use tú when you are talking to somebody of the same age as you or like a very close friend or anything. Most adults address children using tú.*
- *This is also can be use on people thats younger then you.*



U Tu

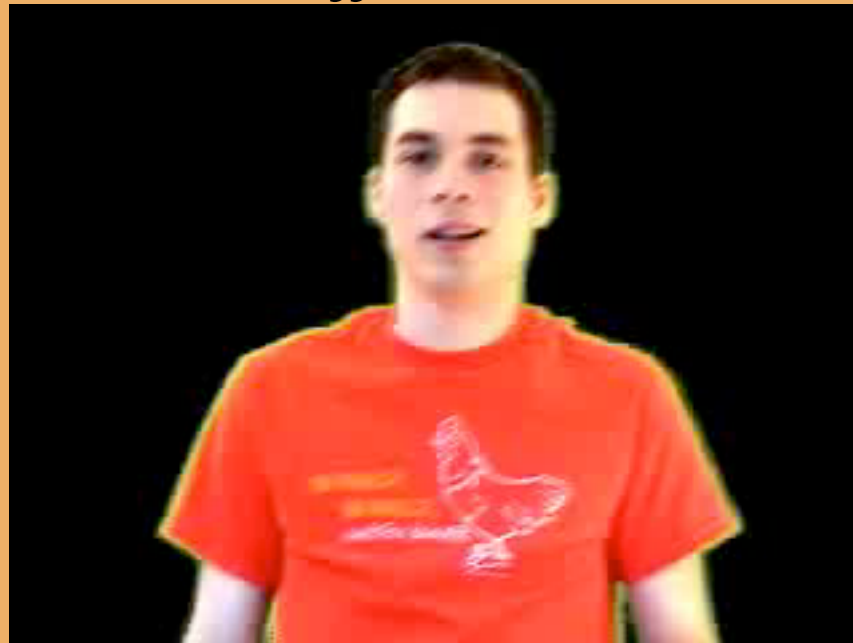


- *The time when you are using U Tu is when you are addressing:*
- *Your friend*
- *a younger person*
- *A classmate*
- *some family members such as cousins, sister, brother etc.*
