Polonius is vexed by
Hamlet pretending
not to know who
exactly he is. He is
even more annoyed
that Hamlet has been
bothering Opheilia,

Polonius during his soliloquy has composed himself and has decided to make an even better effort to connect to Hamlet, even though he wishes Hamlet would have treated him with more respect.

Polonius is
trying to
connect or
empathize with
Hamlet by
seeing if they
have any similar
interests.

POLONIUS

Indeed, that is out of the air.

(aside) How pregnant sometimes his replies are.

A happiness that often madness hits on, which reason and sanity could not so prosperously be delivered of.

I will leave him and suddenly contrive the means of meeting between him and my daughter.

—(to HAMLET) My honorable lord, I will most humbly take my leave of you.

Polonius is speaking directly to Hamlet and is frustrated that he is not cooperating with him on all cylinders.

Polonius believes that because Hamlet talks so much and acts like his time is so precious that it is reason to believe that Hamlet is insane. But he somehow was impressed by Hamlet and wants for him to see his daughter again.

Polonius is remaining polite to Hamlet even though Hamlet has acted rude to him. He also is proclaiming that he has nothing further to say.
