The man only really wants to make his boy happy and knew that this would be a once in a lifetime opportunity to have a can of soda. The boy did enjoy the Coca-Cola and told him "You have some, Papa. I want you to drink it. You have some." (pg. 23) The boy wanted the man to enjoy the moment with him, he wanted the man to also enjoy the can with him.
