

The Missing 43 Protests in Mexico

Disappearance

- 43 students in Iguala, Guerrero Mexico went missing on Sept. 26, 2014.
 Police "intercepted" and then students were
- Police "intercepted" and then students were handed over to Guerreros Unidos (United Warriors) after arrest



Background

- Students hijacked three buses on way to protest hosted by the mayor
- Police interfered and started a shoot out
- Several students forced unto ground and into police vehicles (among the missing)
- "I peeked through a window and saw where the police were pilling a number of compañeros in the police trucks and taking them away." Jorge Vazquez, first year
- Second attack short after once journalists arrived, several shots fired

Reaction

- Not much in the beginning because of unclear details and explanations, lack of evidence
- Human remains confirmed to not be missing students - outrage from the public



Protests

- Chilpancingo (state capitol) students smashed windows and set fire to government buildings
 Municipal place sacked and burned by
 - protesters



Drug War

More than 100,00 Mexicans have been and are being killed in the Mexican Drug War and at least 20,00 disappearances that are becoming less rare every day
For many the Iguala case was "the straw that broke the camel's back"



Aftermath

- A few days following the disappearance, on September 30th the Police Chief, Mayor, and his wife all went into hiding.
 On October 4, the state prosecutor found
- On October 4, the state prosecutor found three mass graves outside of Iguala.
 The following day a man confessed that he
- The following day a man confessed that he had "murdered, burned, and buried" the students in the grave.
