He goes on about his fear of bears, journey and talks about how the trail is getting slowly removed one piece at a time. He switches between his first hand journey of the trail and into an omniscient state and talks about the actions going on all over.

Element #1- Point of View Change

What's this element?

The author is changing how the book is being told, it goes from first person to first person omniscient. So we have our narrator talk about his journey through the trail, encounters, and dialogue. Then we have a break and the narrator goes into this omniscient place where he places down facts from his research. It's not just plain facts, he goes on stuff that is going on to the trail and adds his own thoughts and opinion to it as well.

Why does it matter?

This element is important because not only does it just entertain the reader it also provides a lot of knowledge and information about the trail. It is like a 2-in-1 package and the author really makes it work together. Like the narrator states, the trail is not something really getting talked about and is progressively getting smaller due to these companies cutting down the forest and industrializing it so he uses this to inform people.

What's the impact on the reader?

It makes the reader feel the journey taken by the protagonist but also raises awareness of the trail slowly being ruined and taken apart by these companies. He also highlights how it is an experience where you can only feel through going on a trail like this and that people really should try it in their lifetime

(67)- "About 240 million acres of America's forest are owned by the government. The bulk of this - 191 million acres, spread over 155 parcels of land - is held by the US Forest Service under the designations of National Forests, National Grasslands, and National Recreation Areas. All this sounds soothingly untrampled and ecological, but in fact a great deal of Forest Service land is designated 'multiple use', which is generously interpreted to allow any number of boisterous activities."

He goes on about the Forest Service for a few more pages then goes right into this.

(71)- "We fell into a simple routine. Each morning we rose at first light, shivering and rubbing arms, made coffee, broke camp, ate a couple of fistfuls of raisins, and set off into the silent woods. We would walk walk from about half past seven to four."

Element #2- Dialogue/Comical

Quote

(51)- "She's pretty ugly, isn't she?' he said with a big incongruous beam. I sought for tact. 'Well, only compared with other women.' Katz nodded thoughtfully, then fixed me with a sudden fearful look. 'You know what I look for in a female these days? A heartbeat and a full set of limbs.' I made a sympathetic expression. 'And that's just my starting point, you understand. I'm prepared to compromise on the limbs."

What's this element?

The author adds a comical sense for the reader throughout the book and makes even the most dramatic and suspenseful scenes funny. He does this by either adding funny exchanges of dialogue or just making fun of the situation itself.

Why does it matter?

It is important to the book because it entertains the reader and gives the book life. This makes it also appease to a younger audience and they are usually harder to please and entertain with a book. There are also a lot of facts in the book so this helps balance the seriousness and textbook style out with some comedy and jokes. Which is good to put a smile on the reader's face and boosts the morale of the reader.

What's the impact on the reader?

This element makes the reader feel more comfortable with the book. It gives the sense of looseness and makes it more entertaining.

Element #3- Commas and Adjective /Adverbs

What's this element?

The author is using a lot of commas and a lot of descriptive words. The first quote has 5 commas and the second quote has a massive amount of 12! That is a very high amount and the author uses those commas to include as many descriptions and adjectives/adverbs to paint that picture in your head.

Why does it matter?

This element is important because the hook is about an adventure the protagonist has on his walk throughout the woods. He has a lot to talk about but, you need to be able to see the right things. When explaining a vacation trip you usually just show pictures because that is one of the best ways to express a journey especially one that contains many sights.

What's the impact on the reader?

This element allows the reader to feel as if they were within the scene. Using these descriptive words allows the reader to paint a picture and almost be able to feel as if they were in the scene, whether it is the sight they are looking at, the sounds they listen to or even the smells they smell.

Quote

(133)- "It occurred to me, not for the first time, how delightful, how truly delightful, it would be if MacKaye's original vision had been realized- if the shelters along the trail were proper hotels, with hot showers, individual bunk (with curtains for privacy and reading light, please), and a resident caretaker/cook who would keep a cheery fire dancing in the grate and invite us, any minute now, to take our places at a long long table for dinner of stew and dumpling, cornbread and, oh, let us say, peach cobbler."

Second Annotation


