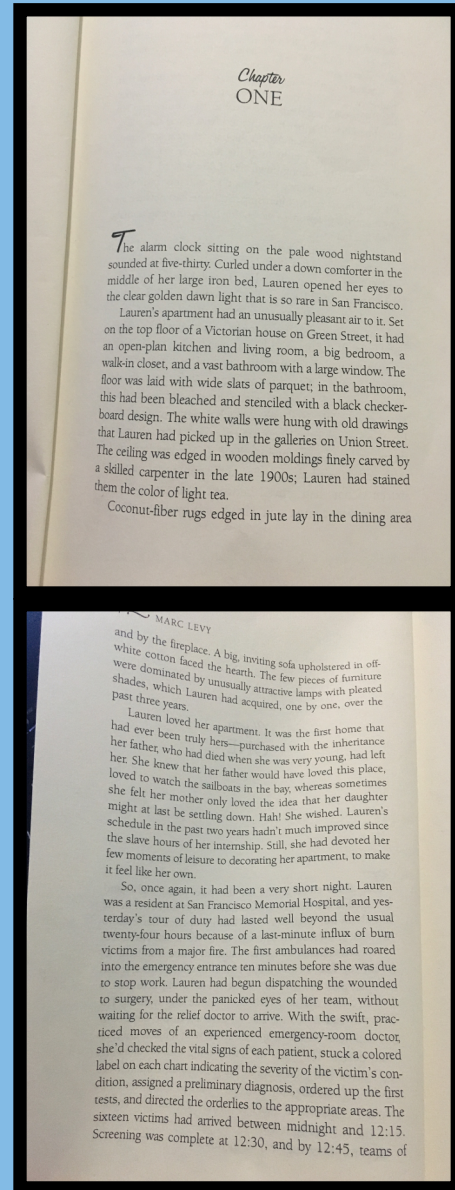
# Flashback

## What's this element?

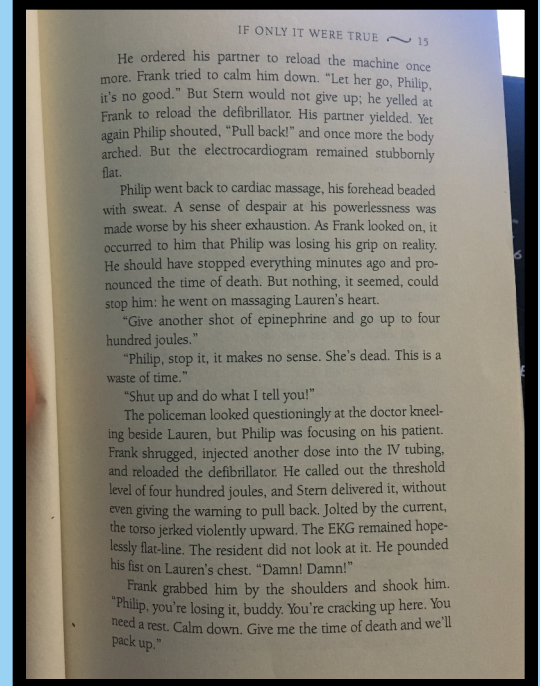
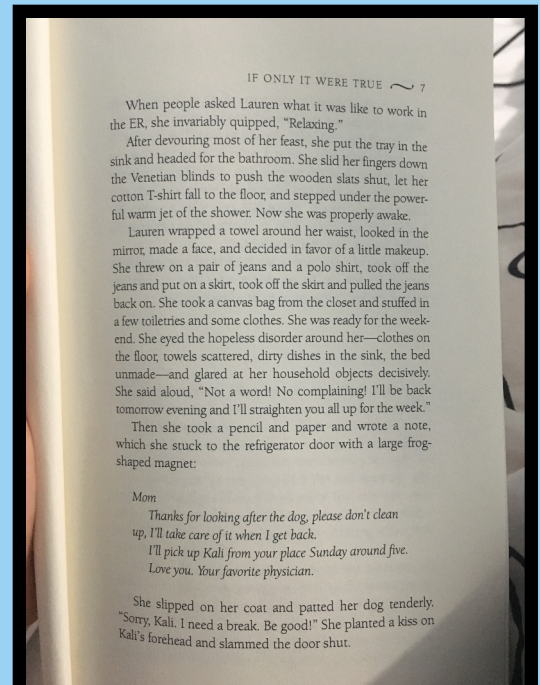

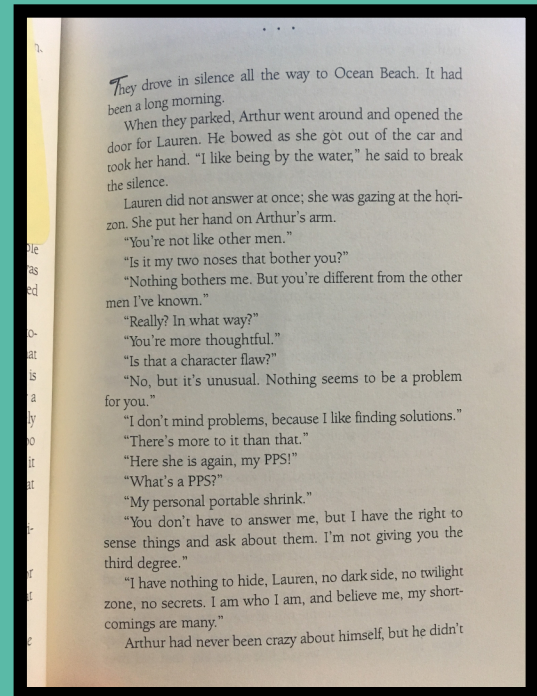
# Dialogue

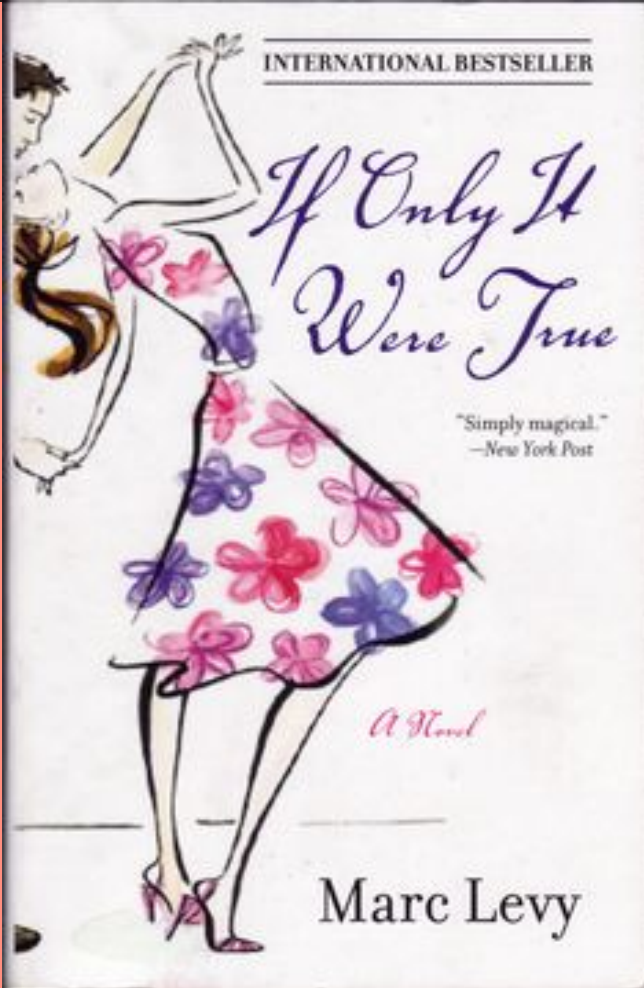
## Element #3
