Component #1: Visuals and Pictures

What's this element?

The author is first describing the disease that the main character has. In the next 3 pages, she shows the procedures and the data that is taken through the hours of the day that pertains to Maddy's disease using <u>pictures and visuals</u>. This specific type of data is documented to make sure that she is alright and nothing abnormal is going on.

Why does it matter?

Visuality is what the author uses consistently to show readers what is happening. This adds to the very descriptive writing that is also present throughout the book. Details, even minor ones, are essential and very helpful. It helps readers to track down what is going on with Maddy physically, mentally, and emotionally.

What's the impact on the reader?

The element lets the reader know that this is something she deals with daily. We know that she feels a way about this routine, but we don't know exactly what she feels. I think author wants readers to understand that this shows something that some teenagers in the real world do or do not have to go through. This is a moment of connection.

Component #2: Letter Form What's this element?

In this part of the book, the author includes a letter from Maddy to her mother. This is a form of communication between two characters other than the use of dialogue. The font and the page structure are even different from the rest of the book because it is a reality that readers can relate to.

Why does it matter?

Switching the structure is what this part of the book does. Like the visuals and the pictures, this is another way to show readers what is going on. Here in these pages, the author show where the character has come from. In the beginning of the book, there was an excerpt from Maddy's childhood diary. Now she has grown and matured, which results in writing a brutally honest letter.

What's the impact on the reader?

I would say relatable. At some point in our lifetime, we will write a letter that we will write put our feelings in concerning ourselves and/or someone else. In this section, I think the author is trying to get us to relate to Maddy. It doesn't have to be to what she is saying, but how she is going about saying it. Which is through the form of a letter.

Component #3: Short & Descriptive Sentence Structure

What's this element?

The author uses adjectives and adverbs to describe everything that is happening in one scene using the smallest sentences possible. This method here makes something that would probably happen really fast and makes it really slow by showing every little detail. Including the emotions or physical appearance of each character, movement of each character, thoughts going through Maddy's mind, and dialogue.

Why does it matter?

I think the significance of this would be that it is used throughout the entire book. Yet the book is still detailed and engaging. The situation was described in slow motion. Everything was happening at once but could be specifically pointed out in this way. Even when she returned back into her home, she said that she was outside for less than a minute.

What's the impact on the reader?

From my experience, this makes me want to read more. Something major is happening in the shortest amount of time. In our everyday lives, something major happens and it's so big but the moment lasted so little. Or did it? There was still an after effect on her, but the actual experience of it was so tiny and fast, but so substantial.

Annotations

1. Part 1 is a description of the character and what has happened in her life so far. In the book though, pictures are used to describe what's going on so far. And so, my pictures are on a separate piece of paper. because they are hand drawn in the book.

In element #2, the structure of this section of the book is a diary entry and a letter. As readers read the letter, it brings a "omg, I feel the same way" feeling. In this case that would be to relate or have a connection with the character through how the author set up these pages. The type of font used even has an impact on the book. It is different from an ordinary page in the book. If you also refer back to the pages, the writing is on a piece of paper, as if it was a page ripped from the original diary or a piece of loose leaf paper from a binder put on the page in the book. In that, the pages become one, but separate.

For element #3, in the book sometimes the structure of the sentence was really short. The amount of words in a sentence ranged from about 1 to 7. But in all that, each word used in each sentence is relevant. This is relevant because it has an impact on how the story is told, short, but detailed and lively. I am hoping that the reader stays interested and that what is going on in the book and how it is presented, they would want to read more.
