The coach makes all the rules, has control over the captains, who have control over the other players, who are like the other women in Gilead. I have a hard role. It is difficult to pay attention to my flaws when I have to keep everyone else in line as well, in fear I might get in trouble if I don't. Which has happened before. Although I have some power it isn't enough to free me from punishments. During one of our class discussions we talked about how Serena Joy gave Offred a picture of her kid."It must have been Martha who got it for her. There's a network of Marthas then, with something in it for them." (pg. 228). Behind this quote was the context of Serena Joy using others for her dirty work. She did have power, and used it wisely. However, she knew in the back of her mind that if she got caught there would be consequences.

While this quote was in this discussion, Noah and his table brought up a question, "Is it better to live without knowledge or uncertainty?" There was a point that was brought up that in our world, knowledge feels inevitable. In a way I feel as if I can connect this to myself. To my understanding the wives sometimes don't want to be on that standard to begin with and when I think to myself I don't either. I want to have my freedom and play softball without being extra supervised and also supervising my team. So is it really better, being a captain instead of a normal player? (pg. 273) This quote can prove that although wives do hold some power, that power isn't enough to be saved from punishments. At the end everybody can get punished the same way. At any point in time Serena Joy could have been that wife. The wife that would soon be hung by a handmaid. It shows that no one is really safe in this society, even if you think you are.

I realize that these are two completely different situations however, by looking at the bigger picture when you are involved in different communities, everyone has a role. Just like if you were in a club, there is a president, a vice president and then the people involved. This can also go for a school. If you look at the dynamics there is the principal, then the teachers, and finally, the students who attend the school. With my situation I could act like a good person and
