Doomsday by Lizzy McAlpine

This song reflects the life of a handmaid in Gilead. It shows the insensitive nature of how the handmaids are treated, feeling as if *Doomsday* is happening to them as they are strictly used as tools in order to conceive more children. However, we see some resilience and fight-back as there is a secret rebel group within the Handmaid's (Mayday) and Offred hanging on, desiring to plan an escape.

She often goes back and forth between the men she currently has in her life, the Commander, Nick, and then thinks back to Luke.
